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Janet Coffman is a Professor of Health Policy at Healthforce Center, the Institute for Health Policy Studies, and the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of California, San Francisco. She also co-directs the UCSF/UC College of the Law, San Francisco Master of Science in Health Policy and Law program. Professor Coffman is an expert on the supply and demand, geographic distribution, and demographic characteristics of health professionals in California and the United States. She is the author of several reports on California's behavioral health workforce needs and strategies to address them. Professor Coffman received a master's degree in public policy and a doctorate in health services and policy analysis from the University of California, Berkeley.

The Philip R. Lee Institute for Health Policy Studies (IHPS) works to solve challenging and complex health policy problems through leadership in research, training, technical assistance, and public service. The IHPS is made up of an interdisciplinary group of researchers who work to advocate for evidence-based approaches to improve healthcare in the United States. It is a significant entity in health policy research and education.

The institute was named after Philip R. Lee, MD, a pioneer in health policy, and who started the Health Policy Program in 1972. In 1981, the UC Board of Regents approved for the Institute to become an organized research unit housed within the UC San Francisco School of Medicine.

In addition to addressing healthcare challenges, the IHPS aims to inform and educate the private sector, government, and other universities about three main areas: Healthcare Systems, Population Health and Determinants, and Clinical Practice.

Healthcare systems refer to the standard of treatment provided, from individual clinics to hospitals. This field's faculty work to turn research into policy. They also concentrate especially on primary care and nursing professionals.

Population Health and Determinants faculty work to address the disparities, and bridge the gap, in healthcare for low-income populations, and advocate for policies related to health access, environmental health, patient vulnerability, and substance use control.

Clinical Practice faculty work to address policies in R&D, pharmaceuticals, digital therapeutics, personalized medicine, and research.

The IHPS works to conduct research, as well as engage in policy advocacy at the state and national level and works to create more comprehensive health policy solutions.

The IHPS uses a multifaceted approach to shape health policy, from clinical practice to broader social determinants, and employs an interdisplinary approach to address a wide variety of issues in the healthcare field.
