Current law requires knowledge that a warrant has been issued before a prohibition on possessing a firearm applies. Further, I believe existing penalties provide the necessary tools to protect public safety and allow for needed discretion to impose appropriate penalties when justified.

Legislative Counsel’s Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 230, as it passed the Senate, required specified law enforcement agencies to maintain a policy that provides a minimum standard on the use of force, including deescalation techniques, crisis techniques, and other alternatives to force when feasible, specific guidelines for the application of deadly force, and factors for evaluating and reviewing all use of force incidents, among other things. SB 230, as it passed the Senate, defined “deadly force” as any use of force reasonably anticipated to create a substantial likelihood of causing death or great bodily injury.

The Assembly amendments, instead, define “deadly force” as any use of force that creates a substantial risk of causing death or serious bodily injury and specify that deadly force includes, but is not limited to, the discharge of a firearm. The Assembly amendments also include the Department of Fish and Wildlife in the list of definition of “law enforcement agency”. The Assembly amendments require the law enforcement agencies to maintain the policy by no later than January 1, 2021.

SB 230, as it passed the Senate, included in the required policy a requirement that officers report potential excessive force to a superior officer and to intercede when present and observing another officer using force that the officer believes to be beyond that which is objectively reasonable under the circumstances based upon the totality of information actually known to the officer.

The Assembly amendments require an officer to report or to intercede when present and observing the use of force that the officer believes to be beyond that which is necessary, as determined by an objectively reasonable officer under circumstances based upon the totality of the circumstances.

SB 230, as it passed the Senate, required training and guidelines regarding vulnerable populations, including physical and developmental disabilities.

The Assembly amendments also require the training and guidelines regarding vulnerable populations to include mental disabilities.

SB 230, as it passed the Senate, required the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training in the Department of Justice to implement a course or courses of instruction in the use of force. SB 230, as it passed the Senate, required the course to include training in the reasonable force doctrine.

The Assembly amendments, instead, require the course to include training on the use of objectively reasonable force.

SB 44, as it passed the Senate, required the state board to include other specified information in the updates to the 2016 mobile source strategy, including, among others, identifying regulation that could improve market acceptance, spur technology advancements, and reduce technology costs.

The Assembly amendments additionally require the state board to update the state board's above-described 2016 mobile source strategy at least every 5 years after the January 1, 2021, update. The Assembly amendments additionally require the state board to include other specified information in the updates to the 2016 mobile source strategy, including identifying regulation that could support the commercialization and deployment of medium- and heavy-duty vehicles that reduce emissions of greenhouse gases. The Assembly amendments require the state board to submit the updated 2016 mobile source strategy to the relevant policy and fiscal committees of the Legislature.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 199, as it passed the Senate, indefinitely extended operation of the Office of the Safety Advocate, and provided that the office was independent of the commission. SB 199, as it passed the Senate, required that the director of the office be appointed by the Governor, subject to confirmation by the Senate, made the director's service subject to the pleasure of the Governor, and required the director to appear annually before the appropriate policy committees of the Assembly and the Senate to report on the activities of the office. SB 199, as it passed the Senate, required that the commission adopt a timeline by which the commission would complete its evaluation of a recommendation made by the office for improvement of the commission's safety management policy and procedures or to its safety culture, required the commission to vote on whether to adopt such a recommendation and, where applicable, required the commission to adopt a timeline for implementation of a recommendation. SB 199, as it passed the Senate, required the office to work with the chief internal auditor of the commission to ensure the commission complies with those requirements.

The Assembly amendments extend operation of the Office of the Safety Advocate until January 1, 2025, and require the office to conduct safety trainings for commission staff, as specified. The Assembly amendments move from the office to the commission the obligation to recommend improvements to the commission's safety management policy and procedures and its safety culture, require those recommendations to be made annually, as specified, and require the executive director to report the commission's findings and recommendations to a subcommittee of the commission. The Assembly amendments authorize the commission to contract with an independent entity to audit the effectiveness of the commission's safety performance. The Assembly amendments require the commission to annually report to the chairperson of the appropriate policy committee of each house of the Legislature on the actions taken by the commission in response to recommended improvements to the commission's safety management policy and procedures and its safety culture, and on the impact of commission safety trainings, with appropriate assessments, surveys, and interviews of staff pertaining to their understanding and implementation of the commission's safety management system and safety culture. The Assembly amendments require the office, by February 1 of each year, to provide to the appropriate policy committee of each house of the Legislature information on

SB 205, as it passed the Senate, required a person who conducts a business operation that is a regulated industry, when applying to a city or a county for an initial business license or business license renewal on and after January 1, 2020, to demonstrate enrollment with the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit program, by providing specified information, under penalty of perjury, on the application, including, among other things, the Standard Industrial Classification Code for the business as requested by the board. SB 205, as it passed the Senate, permitted a city or county to develop a provisional license procedure for business license renewals that provides businesses 3 months to comply with these provisions.

SB 205, as it passed the Senate, required the city or county to confirm that the information submitted to demonstrate enrollment corresponds to the business requesting the initial business license or business license renewal, and required the city or county to transfer that information to the State Water Resources Control Board. SB 205, as it passed the Senate, required the State Water Resources Control Board, on or before April 1, 2020, to post on its internet website a list of applicable Standard Industrial Classification Codes for the purpose of confirmation by cities or counties, and required the state board to update that list annually.

The Assembly amendments instead require the city or county to determine the applicability of any Standard Industrial Classification Code to a General Permit for Storm Water Discharges Associated with Industrial Activities Excluding Construction Activities and, if applicable, to confirm that the information submitted to demonstrate enrollment corresponds to the business requesting the initial business license or business license renewal. The Assembly amendments also require the State Water Resources Control Board to post a list of all Standard Industrial Classification Codes applicable to a General Permit for Storm Water Discharges Associated with Industrial Activities Excluding Construction Activities, for the purpose of determinations made by cities and counties, and require the state board to update that list on its internet website within 90 days of any final updates by the United States Department of Labor or the United States Environmental Protection Agency.

SB 208, as it passed the Senate, required a telecommunications service provider, on or before July 1, 2020, to implement specified protocols or similar standards to verify and authenticate caller identification for calls carried over an internet protocol network. SB 208, as it passed the Senate, authorized the Public Utilities Commission and the Attorney General to take all appropriate actions to enforce Section 227 of Title 47 of the United States Code and authorized the commission to work with the Attorney General for the purpose of enforcing that law.

The Assembly amendments require a telecommunications service provider, on or before January 1, 2021, to implement specified technological protocols or alternative technology that provides comparable or superior capability to verify and authenticate caller identification for calls carried over an internet protocol network. The Assembly amendments provide that a good faith effort to comply with these requirements is a defense to a claim brought pursuant to a specified state unfair competition law. The Assembly amendments authorize the commission and the Attorney General to take all appropriate actions to enforce specified federal telephone equipment restrictions and authorize the commission, at the request of the Attorney General, to work with the Attorney General for the purpose of enforcing parts of that law pertaining to otransmission of caller identification information and state civil enforcement of those federal telephone equipment restrictions.

SB 211, as it passed the Senate, authorized the Department of Transportation to lease on a right of first refusal basis any airspace under a freeway, or real property acquired for highway purposes, that is not excess property, to the city or county in which the airspace or real property is located, or to a political subdivision of the city or county, for purposes of an emergency shelter or feeding program for a lease amount, for up to 10 parcels in the city or county, or political subdivision of the city or county, of \$1 per month, and a payment of an administrative fee not to exceed \$500 per year.

The Assembly amendments instead authorize, until January 1, 2029, the department to offer for lease to a city, county, political subdivision of a city or county, or state agency, airspace and real property acquired for highway purposes that meets certain requirements for purposes of a temporary emergency shelter or feeding program, and require the entity that enters into the lease to pay certain costs to the department, including \$1 per month for the lease and an annual administrative fee of up to \$5,000, or no more than the department’s cost of administering the lease, not to exceed \$15,000.

The Assembly amendments also authorize the department to terminate the lease without penalty if the department determines the leased property is needed for departmental purposes, and require the lease to contain specified terms and conditions.

The Assembly amendments further apply the provisions regarding candidates for nonpartisan office to counties, community college districts, and county boards of education, except as specified, and they make other technical changes.

SB 247, as it passed the Senate, made these provisions effective January 1, 2021.

The Assembly amendments make those provisions applicable to the Wildfire Safety Division within the Public Utilities Commission, rather than the department, authorize the division to engage its own independent evaluator for purposes related to that audit, and make other related changes, as specified. The Assembly amendments make these provisions effective January 1, 2020.

SB 247, as it passed the Senate, also required the commission to establish a 2-way balancing account for each electrical corporation for all costs incurred by the electrical corporation for vegetation management, as specified, and to ensure that each electrical corporation fully recovers all costs incurred to comply with specified requirements and all other reasonable vegetation management activity.

The Assembly amendments delete those provisions.

The Senate version also deleted the prohibition relative to persons, among others, who have been convicted of a felony and who have not had their civil rights reinstated from being eligible and qualified to be a prospective trial juror.

The Assembly amendments delete the expansion of the types of lists considered inclusive of a representative cross section of the population for the purposes of jury selection. The Assembly amendments instead prohibit persons who have been convicted of a felony and are currently on parole, postrelease community supervision, felony probation, or mandated supervision for the conviction of a felony, and persons who are currently required to register as a sex offender based on a felony conviction from being eligible and qualified to be a prospective trial juror. The Assembly amendments state that the provisions relating to the eligibility and qualification to be a prospective trial juror are severable.

SB 407, as it passed the Senate, among other things, excluded certain benefits, discounts, and programs from new or innovative benefits that were offered as part of a Medicare supplement contract or policy, and required the charging of a separate premium cost associated with those benefits, a specified explanation of benefit coverage, and the offering of the benefits only as a rider to the contract or policy.

The Assembly amendments instead limit the above-described exclusion to outpatient prescription drug benefits, and remove the requirements for the separate premium cost, coverage explanation, and rider. The Assembly amendments require the portion of the premium attributed to the new or innovative benefits to be identified as a separate line item on the payment invoice or bill. The Assembly amendments exclude new or innovative benefits from the determination of whether benefits are equal to or lesser than those provided by the previous coverage.

The Assembly amendments authorize the Director of the Department of Managed Health Care and the Insurance Commissioner to issue guidance on these requirements, and require the respective guidance to be effective only through December 31, 2022, or until the director or the commissioner promulgate regulations.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 463, as it passed the Senate, required the operator of a gas storage well to (1) include in its risk management plan, required to be submitted for the State Oil and Gas Supervisor's approval under existing law, a complete chemical inventory of the materials, of any phase, used on or in the gas storage wells for any purpose, (2) regularly quantify and report to the Division of Oil, Gas, and Geothermal Resources the chemical composition of the gas, including trace impurities, stored in the gas storage well, based on a representative number of wells sampled, and (3) develop and implement a plan to, in the event of a leak, monitor emissions from the gas storage well and related equipment that is capable of quantifying the chemical composition of gas, and any suspended materials, released to the environment. SB 463, as it passed the Senate, required the operator, for any leak that is reportable under existing law, to include in that report to the division the chemical composition of the leak, including all components of released material, and required the division to post the information received pursuant to these provisions on its internet website.

The Assembly amendments instead require the operator of a gas storage well to provide to the division (1) a complete chemical inventory of the materials, of any phase, that may be emitted from the gas storage well in the event of a reportable leak, as specified, and (2), in the event of a reportable leak, the composition of well kill fluids within 5 days of their use in a leaking gas storage well and any updates to the provided information described in (1) to ensure that it is current. The Assembly amendments authorize the division in specified circumstances to require certain chemical suppliers to furnish the composition information to the division. The Assembly amendments delete a certain exclusion of well stimulation treatments that are used for routine maintenance of wells associated with underground storage facilities where natural gas is injected into and withdrawn from depleted or partially depleted oil or gas reservoirs from the applicability of provisions requiring well stimulation permits. In the event of a reportable leak, the Assembly amendments require the division to post the information related to the reportable leak received pursuant to these provisions on its internet website. The Assembly amendments require the division, within specified timeframes, to review and, if necessary, revise certain natural gas storage well policies and regulations, as specified.

The bill authorized a student to affirmatively exercise an option to not receive an associate degree for transfer or to not be included in the identification system.

The Assembly amendments add provisions that require the identification system to be also accessible by independent institutions of higher education and that specify that the bill would be implemented in full commencing with the fall term of the 2020–21 academic year.

The Assembly amendments instead exempt an action to enforce the California Public Records Act from existing provisions that shift specified post offer costs and require a party who does not accept an opposing party’s offer and fails to obtain a more favorable judgment or award to pay the opposing party’s postoffer costs, including attorneys’ fees.

SB 600, as it passed the Senate, provided that individual or group health care service plan contracts or health insurance policies that cover hospital, medical, or surgical expenses include coverage for standard fertility preservation services when a medically necessary treatment may cause iatrogenic infertility to an enrollee or insured, and added standard fertility preservation services to the Medi-Cal program schedule of benefits when a medically necessary treatment may cause iatrogenic infertility to a beneficiary.

The Assembly amendments remove the provisions relating to health insurance policies and the Medi-Cal schedule of benefits and, with respect to health care service plan contracts, instead provide that when a covered treatment may cause iatrogenic infertility to an enrollee, standard fertility preservation services are a basic health care service, as defined, and are not within the scope of coverage for infertility treatment, as specified. The Assembly amendments exempt from these provisions Medi-Cal managed care health care service plan contracts and entities that contract with the State Department of Health Care Services to deliver health care services pursuant to the Medi-Cal program.

The Assembly amendments, instead require the lessee to obtain personal liability coverage, in an amount not to exceed 10 times the annual rent charged for the dwelling, covering property damage and personal injury proximately caused by the installation or operation of the electric vehicle charging station.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

(1)SB 744, as it passed the Senate, among other things, defined the terms “objective development standards and policies” and “objective design review standards” for purposes of specified existing law relating to approval of certain supportive housing developments as a use by right. SB 744 required a local government to comply with specified conditions before adopting an ordinance subjecting such a project to design review, as provided. SB 744 required that the local government’s review of a supportive housing development to determine whether it complies with objective development standards be conducted consistent with specified existing law.

The Assembly amendments delete the definition of the terms “objective development standards and policies” and “objective design review standards,” as described above, and the above-described limitation on a local government from requiring design review. The Assembly amendments specify, for purposes of the above-described requirement that review of a development be consistent with specified law, that objective development standards includes objective design review standards, and that the review does not constitute a “project” for purposes of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The Assembly amendments additionally revise the affordability requirement for a supportive housing development to qualify as a use by right under existing law to instead require that 100% of the units in the development (A) be restricted to lower income households and (B) are or will be receiving public funding to ensure affordability. The Assembly amendments also specify that these existing use by right provisions for supportive housing do not preclude or limit the ability of a developer to seek any concessions, incentives, or waivers of development standards pursuant to that specified law. The Assembly amendments make various nonsubstantive changes to these provisions.

(2)SB 744, as it passed the Senate, made various changes to the review under CEQA of a project for funding or approving a No Place Like Home project, as that term is defined. Among these changes, SB 744, as it passed the Senate, required a local agency, if it approved or determined to carry out a No Place Like Home project to file and post a notice required by specified law or file a notice of exemption with the county clerk for each county in which the project is located, depending on whether or not that project is subject to CEQA, as provided. SB 744, as it passed the Senate, required a person filing an action or proceeding challenging the lead

agency's action, on the grounds of noncompliance with CEQA, to do so within 30 days of the date of filing the above-described notice or of the lead agency's decision to approve or carry out the project, depending on whether or not the project is subject to CEQA. SB 744, as it passed the Senate, applied specified California Rules of Court to any action or proceeding to attack, review, set aside, void, or annul the certification or adoption of an environmental review document for a No Place Like Home project or the granting of any approval for that project.

The Assembly amendments revise the definition of "No Place Like Home project" for these purposes and nonsubstantively revise the above-described notice requirements for the approval of such a project. The Assembly amendments also instead require that an action or proceeding challenging a lead agency's action, as described above, be filed within 30 days of the filing of the notice of approval or the notice of exemption or, if the local agency fails to comply with the applicable timelines for those notices, the earlier of 30 days from the date of the local agency's late filing or 90 days from the date the notice was required to be filed. The Assembly amendments delete the provision applying the above-described California Rules of Court to an action or proceeding under CEQA relating to a No Place Like Home Project. The Assembly amendments repeal these provisions relating to the review of a No Place Like Home project under CEQA as of January 1 of the year following notification, provided as specified, that funding pursuant to the No Place Like Home Program is fully allocated and disbursed.

SB 156, as it passed the Senate, required the State Department of Public Health to issue a special permit to allow a general acute care hospital to offer emergency stabilization services at a location that is outside of the hospital, including serving as an emergency medical services receiving site if authorized to do so by the medical director of the local emergency medical services agency, if the hospital provides satisfactory evidence to the department that the hospital has a written transfer agreement with the hospital closest to the location where emergency stabilization services will be provided, and satisfactory evidence to the department that this location meets certain requirements, including that the location has a physician who is board certified in emergency medicine onsite at all times.

The Assembly amendments delete the requirement that the location has a physician who is board certified in emergency medicine onsite at all times, and instead require the location to provide clinical laboratory and radiological services onsite. The amendments additionally require the hospital satisfactory evidence that the hospital has a written transfer agreement with any other hospital necessary to ensure the safe and effective transfer of patients needing services outside the capacity of the closest hospital. The Assembly amendments require a hospital that was issued this special permit to report bed and service utilization data in a specified manner for purposes of completing the Annual Report of Hospitals. The Assembly amendments repeal these provisions on January 1, 2028.
