I am returning Senate Bill 275 without my signature.

This bill would require appointment of the State Oil and Gas Supervisor to be subject to Senate confirmation. I share the Legislature's desire for appointments to be made effectively and transparently, especially when considering California's ambitious and time-sensitive clean energy and carbon neutrality goals.

However, an appointee to this position already undergoes an extensive and exhaustive identification, evaluation, and selection process, a process that ensures the appointee is experienced and fully capable of carrying out our shared policy objectives of protecting public health, safety, and the environment. Additionally, this position falls under the direction and oversight of the Director of Conservation, a gubernatorial appointee that is subject to Senate confirmation.

For these reasons, I am returning this bill without my signature.

The Assembly amendments delete the contents of the bill and instead require the Department of Cannabis Control, no later than March 1, 2024, to allow a cultivation licensee to change the type of size of a cultivation license or to place a cultivation license in inactive status, as specified. The Assembly amendments also require the department, in implementing these provisions, to allow each licensee a one-time opportunity to change the date of license renewal.

SB 68, as it passed the Senate, authorized the Department of the California Highway Patrol to, by regulation, allow a driver of a tank vehicle with a capacity of more than 500 gallons transporting flammable liquid to exceed the maximum driving time of 10 hours in a work period during a declared state of emergency if transporting aircraft fuel used for refueling aircraft used in fire suppression or other emergency-related activities, as specified.

The Assembly amendments authorize the department to additionally allow a driver to be exempt from the prohibition against driving any period after having been on duty for 80 hours in any consecutive 8 days in the circumstances described above and makes the provisions applicable to the transport of other fuel types used in emergency-related activities, including fire suppression.

SB 354, as it passed the Senate, among other things, required the Commission on Teacher Credentialing to, on or before January 1, 2025, revise its administrative services credential standards and performance expectations to include and strengthen preparation for inclusion, with a focus on, among other things, universal design for learning (UDL) and required administrator preparation programs to ensure faculty are prepared in, among other things, UDL and inclusive practices. SB 354, as it passed the Senate, required, contingent upon an appropriation, the State Department of Education to, on or before March 31, 2025, develop and disseminate joint guidance clarifying the ways in which inclusive classrooms and placements may be staffed under current law, as provided, and required the department to, on or before March 31, 2025, submit a report to the Legislature on recommendations for statutory or regulatory changes necessary to eliminate barriers to the staffing of inclusive placements, as provided.

The Assembly amendments change the date by which the commission is required to revise the administrative services credential standards and performance expectations described above from January 1, 2025, to instead be June 30, 2025. The Assembly amendments change the date by which the department is required to develop and disseminate joint guidance clarifying the ways in which inclusive classrooms and placements may be staffed from March 31, 2025, to instead be March 31, 2027. The amendments change the date by which the department is required to submit a report to the Legislature on recommendations for statutory or regulatory changes necessary to eliminate barriers to the staffing of inclusive placements from March 31, 2025, to instead be March 31, 2026, make conforming changes, and make the requirement to provide that report contingent upon appropriation by the Legislature.

SB 583, as it passed the Senate, among other things, (1) established the Salton Sea Conservancy as a state agency within the Natural Resources Agency to undertake various activities related to the Salton Sea region, (2) required the conservancy to be governed by a board of directors composed of a designated membership, (3) set forth the powers, duties, and limitations of the board of directors and the conservancy, and (4) created the Salton Sea Conservancy Fund and made moneys in the fund available, upon appropriation by the Legislature, for purposes of the conservancy.

The Assembly amendments, among other things, (1) revise the purposes of the conservancy, as specified, (2) revise the membership of the conservancy's board of directors, as provided, (3) require the conservancy to be governed by a board of directors by January 1, 2026, (4) require the board of directors to prepare and adopt a strategic plan to achieve the goals of the conservancy, as provided, (5) revise certain powers and duties of the conservancy, and (6) make moneys in the Salton Sea Conservancy Fund, including authorized proceeds from the sale of bonds and allocations from the Salton Sea Lithium Fund, available, upon appropriation by the Legislature, for purposes of the conservancy.

SB 722, as it passed the Senate, prohibited a child care provider who completes and submits all sections of the incidental medical services plan template described above from being subject to professional review, liable in civil action, or subject to criminal prosecution for the administration of medication, unless that administration constitutes gross negligence or willful or malicious conduct.

The Assembly amendments delete the provisions related to professional review, civil liability, or criminal prosecution described above and authorize a licensed child daycare facility that submits to the department a completed incidental medical services plan using the template form described above to enroll a child prior to departmental approval of the plan.

The Assembly amendments extend the reporting period to within 120 hours of a coroner or medical examiner's examination.

SB 264, as it passed the Senate, extended the operative date of the personal income tax and corporate income tax deduction for disaster losses in any city, county, or city and county that is proclaimed by the Governor to be in a state of emergency to taxable years beginning before January 1, 2029. SB 264 also stated the intent of the Legislature to comply with the requirement that acts authorizing a new tax expenditure provide specific goals, purposes, and objectives, detailed performance indicators, and data collection requirements for that tax expenditure, and complied with those requirements for purposes of the deduction for disaster losses.

The Assembly amendments remove the statement of intent, but retain the specific goals, purposes, and objectives, detailed performance indicators, and data collection requirements for purposes of the deduction for disaster losses.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 449, as it passed the Senate, authorized the Peace Officer Standards Accountability Division to initially review confidential, sensitive, or private information introduced during decertification proceedings, and authorized the division, at its discretion, to submit this information under seal and require the examination of this information in a closed session by the Peace Officer Standards Accountability Advisory Board or the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training, after which the board or commission may, by a majority vote, make the information available for public review under terms and conditions deemed just and appropriate.

The Assembly amendments instead authorize the division to redact these public records in their discretion for specified reasons.

SB 449, as it passed the Senate, also authorized the commission to withhold from public disclosure any information that could jeopardize an ongoing investigation, create a risk of harm or injury to a victim or witness, or otherwise create a risk of harm or injury that outweighs the interest in disclosure.

The Assembly amendments instead authorize the commission to withhold this information from the subject peace officer for the same reasons, as specified.

The Assembly amendments also clarify that the authority of the commission to suspend, revoke, or cancel any certification extends to any certificate or proof of eligibility that is invalid, inactive, expired, or canceled, and also allow the commission to cancel any certificate or proof of eligibility that was fraudulently obtained, as specified.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 509, as it passed the Senate, among other things, required local educational agencies, as defined, to, on or before July 1, 2027, certify to the State Department of Education that 75% of each of its classified and certificated employees, who have direct contact with pupils at school, have received youth behavioral health training, as specified.

The Assembly amendments delete the provisions that required local educational agencies to certify the above-described youth behavioral training and, instead, require the department to, on or before January 1, 2025, recommend best practices and identify evidence-based and evidence-informed training programs for schools to address youth behavioral health, as specified, and require local educational agencies to, on or before January 1, 2027, certify to the department that 100 percent of its certificated employees and 40 percent of its classified staff, who have direct contact with pupils in any of grades 7 to 12, have received the youth behavioral health training, as provided.

SB 509, as it passed the Senate, required local educational agencies to ensure that all pupils in grades 1 to 12, inclusive, receive evidence-based, age-appropriate mental health education from instructors trained in the appropriate courses at least once in elementary school, at least once in junior high school or middle school, as applicable, and at least once in high school, as provided.

The Assembly amendments delete the provisions that require all pupils in grades 1 to 12, inclusive, to receive the above-described mental health education and, instead, include instruction on mental health in the health component of the adopted course of study for grades 1 to 6, inclusive.

The Assembly amendments also make nonsubstantive changes to resolve chaptering conflicts with AB 285 and AB 446.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 548, as it passed the Senate, amended provisions of the Public Employees' Retirement Law (PERL) to authorize a county and the trial court located within the county to elect to separate their joint Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) contract into individual contracts and prescribed a process for this. SB 548, as it passed the Senate, prohibited the separation from being a cause for modification of employee retirement benefits. SB 548, as it passed the Senate, required the system's board of administration, within its existing resources, to do a specified computation of assets and liabilities for a county and trial court seeking to separate their joint contract. SB 548, for the purposes of the California Public Employees' Pension Reform Act of 2013 (PEPRA), authorized a county and a trial court to provide employees the defined benefit plan or formula that those employees received from their respective employers prior to the exercise of the option to separate.

The Assembly amendments make an election to separate a joint contract under the above-described circumstances irrevocable and, upon separation of the joint contract, make a county and trial court ineligible to reestablish a joint contract. The Assembly amendments also revise the above-described provisions requiring the board to perform a separate computation of the assets and liabilities to specify that this computation is to occur upon request and not to exceed once every five years in accordance with specified procedures. The Assembly amendments make various other conforming changes, including revising the timeframe for separating a joint contract.

SB 613, as it passed the Senate, exempted certain local jurisdictions that dispose of fewer than 5,000 tons of solid waste from targets for reducing organic waste in landfills until December 31, 2028, and authorized the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery to provide cities and counties meeting certain conditions with an extended schedule for recovering organic waste.

The Assembly amendments instead waive organic waste reduction targets until December 31, 2028, for certain local jurisdictions that disposed of fewer than 5,000 tons of solid waste in 2014 and that do not qualify for other specified waivers. The Assembly amendments authorize the department to renew the waiver, as specified.

The Assembly amendments additionally revise the definition of "seasonal brand of beer" for the purposes of provisions permitting the return of beer from a licensee, to mean a brand of beer that is brewed by a manufacturer to recognize a season or a holiday.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 619, as it passed the Senate, authorized the State Energy Resources Conservation and Development Commission (Energy Commission), when evaluating applications for the certification of certain eligible electrical transmission facilities, to consider whether an applicant certifies that a capital investment of at least \$250,000,000 will be made over a period of 5 years.

The Assembly amendments delete those provisions and instead authorize an electrical corporation that files an application with the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) to authorize the new construction of any electrical transmission facility to simultaneously submit to the Energy Commission an application for certification of the facility as an environmental leadership development project, as specified. The Assembly amendments, among other things, provide that the Energy Commission's certification of a facility proposed by an electrical corporation satisfies and replaces the PUC's obligations under CEQA with respect to that facility. The Assembly amendments also require an applicant applying for certification of an electrical transmission project to take certain actions, including, among other actions, to avoid or minimize significant environmental impacts in any disadvantaged community.

Legislative Counsel's Digest of Assembly Amendments

SB 40, as it passed the Senate, required the State Bar of California (State Bar) to charge an annual license fee of up to an unspecified amount for active licensees for 2024.

The Assembly amendments, among other things, fix the maximum fee amount for active licensees for 2024 at \$390 and the maximum fee amount for inactive licensees at \$97.40. The Assembly amendments require the State Bar to prepare a report on, among other things, how it would use revenue generated by an increase in the mandatory annual license fees, as specified. The Assembly amendments authorize the State Bar to use the net proceeds from the sale of its San Francisco office to cover employee salaries and operational costs associated with the State Bar's discipline system and administration of the biannual admissions exam. The Assembly amendments authorize the board of trustees to disburse or appropriate to its general fund excess funds not needed to support the Client Security Fund or the Attorney Diversion and Assistance Program, as specified.

The Assembly amendments, additionally, make various revisions and additions to certain leadership positions of the State Bar. The Assembly amendments impose specified conflict-of-interest provisions on members of the board and employees of the State Bar, and expand the circumstances under which a member of the board must disqualify themself from a decision of the board. The Assembly amendments revise and recast provisions relating to background checks of State Bar employees, prospective employees, volunteers, contractors, subcontractors, applicants for admission or reinstatement, and licensees. The Assembly amendments revise the type and timing of access to certain bar examination materials granted to an applicant who did not pass the California bar examination.
